How the Fund works

The Fund is managed in Sheffield by a small coalition of women. We work in partnership with Sheffield Palestine Solidarity Campaign, Saddleworth Palestine Women's Scholarship Fund, Bolton Socialist Club, Sheffield Palestine Education Network and Rotherham Friends of Palestine.

In Gaza the Fund is administered by a panel drawn from the Board of Directors of the Red Crescent Society and the Union of Health Work Committees. A community-based organisation, Afaq Jadeeda, provides admin support. In West Bank a committee has been formed to administer the Fund, including representatives from Birzeit University Women's Studies Department, Sunbula and the Middle East Children's Alliance (MECA).

There are strict criteria for student selection. In Gaza candidates are nominated by their local community centre. They must have attained 65% or above in their school exams and be from families that cannot afford university fees. Active involvement in the local community is also a requirement and family circumstances, such as a recent home demolition, are taken into account. In the West Bank similar criteria will be adopted.

How to support the Fund

History of the Sheffield Palestine Women's Scholarship Fund

The idea for the Fund came out of a 'Palestinian Women Speak' event held in Sheffield in 2006. Dr Mona El Farra (Union of Health Work Committees and Red Crescent Society Board Member in Gaza) talked about the hurdles young Palestinian women face in accessing higher education. She told us about how life-enhancing the experience of university can be. Palestine can only gain, she said, if more young women are equipped to take on professional and leadership roles.

Using money raised by the event, the Sheffield Palestine Women's Scholarship Fund (SPWSF) was born, a small group of women becoming its steering group. In 2007, our first year, we supported just 3 students to go to university. By 2018 we were sponsoring 65 women per year to study in the Gaza Strip. We became a charity in 2010, enabling us to seek gift aid and boost our funds.

What is the Sheffield Palestine Women's Scholarship Fund?

The Fund enables women in Palestine, who would otherwise not be able to, to access higher education. We focus on women because many families, given the high cost of higher education and the poverty and unemployment in Palestine, tend to concentrate what resources they have on their sons.

All SPWSF students attend universities in Palestine. Until 2019 we worked solely in the Gaza Strip. Here a university education can greatly diminish the suffocation and isolation that Gazans feel. As one of our students said: "through education we discover the world." From 2019 we will be offering a small number of scholarships to women from marginalised communities in the West Bank.



We raise funds for scholarships through running events and by encouraging supporters to take out monthly standing orders or to make donations. We also receive one-off donations (including legacies).
