I want to help people, especially women

We meet Dalya, one of our West Bank students

In October 2022, three of the Scholarship Fund's organising group spent a fortnight touring Jerusalem, the West Bank and Nazareth as members of Tadhamon Singers ('tadhamon' is Arabic for solidarity). Whilst we were staying in Aida Refugee Camp in Bethlehem, Josie Shields-Stromness and Shirabe Yamada, members of the West Bank Scholarship Fund Committee, introduced us to Dalya Nasser, one of the Fund's students.

Dalya was very happy to talk about herself and her dreams and aspirations. She said she chose to go to Birzeit university because it has the only music department in the West Bank and moreover it has a course that includes rapping. When she started university it had been Dalya's ambition to become a musician, but she now wants to be a music therapist. "I want to help people, especially women, to make their lives better," she told us. So now psychology

is Dalya's major subject and music her minor.

Dalya talked about the social pressure three of her friends are under. They were arrested in 2020 and after their release were told by their community that they were strong and being really brave but, she said, "...underneath I can see they are not OK and need help." She told us that there are few organisations that support women, including women whose husbands

are in Israeli jails. And she wants to help teenagers, but especially women and girls.

Dalya lives in the Deheisheh refugee camp in Bethlehem. Her interest in rapping began when she was 13, she told us. She and some of her friends turned to Shoruq (an organisation in the camp that works to develop the creative potential of children and young people) for help developing their rapping skills, but the Shoruq staff only wanted to know where their brothers and fathers were. Dalya wrote a rap in response to this, which her mother liked. Then in 2015 and again in 2020 she, and two other girl rappers, visited the US on cultural exchange visits organised by Shoruq. There they were able to learn more about how to write their own raps.

It was a delight to meet Dalya and listen to her story. She then treated us to some of her amazing rapping! Her obvious talent and ambition are inspiring. It was also humbling as we spoke in English with no interpreter.

Meeting Eman 🔀

an Arabic language student from the West Bank

It was a historic occasion when, earlier last year – in March 2022 – Kirsty Wright and Josie Shields-Stromness (members of the Scholarship Fund's West Bank Scholarship committee) introduced me to Eman Al Najjar. This was the first time a member of the Sheffield organising group had been able to meet with one of our students in Palestine.

Eman was born and brought up in the Al Fawwar Camp and when we met – at a restaurant in Hebron – she was making good headway towards the end of her first year at Hebron University studying Arabic Language Teaching. Our get-together was quite an event for Eman who, due to COVID-19 restrictions, had never met any of the other scholarship fund students or even anyone from the West Bank Committee that had allocated the scholarship to her, amidst very stiff

competition.

Eman is from a family of six daughters, in a single-female-headed household. She was accompanied by her mother and one of her younger sisters. This was the first time the family had been able to hear about the origins of the Scholarship Fund and they were understandably surprised to meet me and two other fund supporters from Sheffield in person. We heard from the family just how tough the last two years had been in Palestine, when the hardships and injustices inflicted by the Israeli occupation were compounded by COVID-19 lockdown restrictions that had lasted throughout

the preceding two years. No furlough schemes existed in Palestine, and the almost total shutdown of tourism, plus the huge decrease in Palestinians being able to work inside Israel, had had a devastating impact on the fragile Palestinian economy.

Kirsty explained to the family how the West Bank committee allocates scholarships and she emphasised what a huge achievement it was for Eman to be one of the students chosen and how proud she should be. Eman herself was a little overawed by the occasion, but she said she was determined to do well and to achieve her dreams. Eman's mother was visibly moved by the meeting with us and made a short speech in which she explained how hard life was for them as a family, but how proud she was as a mother of Eman. She told us with a beaming smile, 'Eman is very, very clever and she's going to achieve a lot'. Meanwhile Eman's younger sister sat quietly taking it all in and then announced that she would definitely, like Eman, be going to university and she'd try her best to get a scholarship!

The Power of Education 🔀

Four Gazan students tell us about their families and the importance of education

I'm **Mona Banat**, I'm nineteen and in my second year at Al-Azhar university studying computer engineering. I live with my mother and father and I have seven siblings. My mother doesn't work and my father is a self-employed builder, which means he doesn't have a secure income and we sometimes have to ask relatives to help us out. My father also has medical issues. He had an accident two years ago and this affects how much he can work.



I do as much as I can at home, but my parents understand that studying takes time and effort. Neither my parents nor my

grandparents went to university, but my family believes in the power of education and how it can help build a better future. I have an older brother, who was given a scholarship to study medicine, and my younger sister and three brothers all hope they will find support to go to university. A university education is very important to my family. If we can graduate and get jobs, we can help out family members and build our community and country.



My name is **Iba'a Hamoda** and I am studying engineering. My father passed away in 2018 and I live with my mother. We have had no source of income as she is unemployed and my two brothers and sister, although university graduates, have no jobs because of the difficult situation in Gaza.

It's very important to my mother and my family that I continue my university studies. I am grateful to them for always being supportive. I'm hoping that when I graduate I can do postgraduate studies and hopefully find a job and build a career. I am from a family of university graduates. We believe in studying and pursuing our dream careers.

Since my father died and my younger brother moved abroad and my older brother married, my mother needs my help more at home and it can be difficult to keep up with my studies, but I do

my best and I'm still able to get high scores. The one thing that gives us hope in Gaza is that we can build a future for ourselves. All I want is to finish my studies at university and find a job to support my family.



I'm Hana Ahmad, I'm nineteen and in my second year studying Multimedia Technology at the Islamic University. I come from an educated family. My father holds a master's degree in accounting, my mother a degree in education. One of my brothers is already a graduate and I have a brother and sister at university. My younger sister is still in high school, but she's hoping to go to university.

My family felt indescribable pride and joy when, having finished school successfully, I gained a place at university. My family supports me in my university studies and I organise my time so I can help at home without neglecting my studies.

Having three children at university has added a lot of cost to my family. Our only income is what my father earns and his office was destroyed during Israeli bombardment of Gaza. He has not received any compensation (we have also not received compensation for the damage to our house in 2014). Despite this, my parents are happy and proud, and they look forward very much to celebrating my graduation.

I am very glad that I have been able to go to university. I really love my specialty and I also feel a responsibility to achieve my parents' dreams. So I put a lot of effort into studying and increasing my knowledge of multimedia technology.

My name Is **Noor Rayan**. I'm twenty-two and in the last year of a dental degree. My father died in 2014, my mother is unemployed and I have four siblings, all of them still at school. We are reliant on government support and it's been difficult paying the dental college fees because they are very high. However, my mother is very proud of me and she was determined that I complete my education as a dentist. She is now encouraging my siblings to follow me and become medical students.



It takes time to study but I am trying to find a balance between studying and helping my family. I hope that my graduation and my work as a dentist will relieve the hardship we face and I'll be able to support my younger siblings to complete their degrees. I will do my best to overcome all the difficulties we encounter as a family and I hope to become an active person in my community.

This year's scholarships

We awarded **62** scholarships this year! **55** scholarships to young women in Gaza and **7** to young women in the West Bank. This was a smaller number



than last year because we are coming to the end of the large donations and legacies we've received in recent years. In fact we'd been starting reluctantly to consider that we may have to scale down our scholarship programme, in the absence of larger funds, when in February 2023 we received an anonymous legacy of £10,000 from a long-standing supporter. This very generous bequest, together with the Arwa Memorial Fund, set up after the death of Arwa Abu Haikal Havard, friend and supporter of the Scholarship Fund, will mean that – with the regular standing orders and fundraising efforts of our loyal supporters – we should be able to continue to fund similar numbers of scholarships in both Gaza and the West Bank next year (2023-24).

As always, we thank our partners in Palestine, who administer the Fund often in very difficult circumstances. And we are so proud of our students, who have such enthusiasm for their studies and who are so determined to use their education to make a better life. We offer our heartfelt congratulations to the **19** students who graduated this year in Gaza.

Below is a letter we received in September 2022 from **Dr Mona El Farra**, the Scholarship Fund's founder and our longstanding partner in Gaza.

Today was a special day. We held the annual Scholarship Fund award ceremony at Afaq Jadeeda, the organisation that administers the Fund in Gaza. I feel so proud of our Scholarship Fund and so proud of the 55 students who received a scholarship this year, 6 of whom are new students.

It was an informal and warm meeting. I acted like a granny giving out pieces of advice. We discussed the importance of reading and time management and I shared some of my own work and life experiences. We also spoke about the importance of volunteering and community participation. It was a round table discussion.

Most of the young women were shy, but in the end they were encouraged to speak. We joked together. I passed on your good wishes and messages of solidarity to them. I told them about the start of the Women's Scholarship Fund and how happy I feel when I meet doctors, nurses, teachers and other professionals in different places and they turn out to be our Scholarship Fund graduates.

To my great pleasure four of our Scholarship Fund students excelled academically this year and were the top student at their universities. The hard situation in Palestine, and the individual hardships they face, bring out the best in these less privileged young women, as does your belief in them, your belief in humanity and social justice and your continuing activism.

The Scholarship Fund is not only about providing young women with a scholarship, which is extremely important in shaping their future lives, it is also about listening to their stories of hope, to their stories of daily challenges and obstacles, and to their stories of success. I left the meeting on a promise that they will write down their stories for you and Wafaa, our volunteer, will help with that. The parents were so pleased and involved in the discussion. It was such a friendly atmosphere. We joked and laughed.

Thank you for giving me this chance to be part of this work and to see the smiles on the young women's faces despite all the difficulties they face. I felt so good. You made one of my days in Gaza, under siege, occupation and social constraint, very special.

The restaurant owners were pleased to support us, providing food at cost whilst Manchester PSC advertised the event as their Christmas social and provided a stall, as they do at all our events. Over 80 people attended, enjoying a wonderful buffet supper. Ticket sales, together with raffle and donations from supporters who could not attend, raised over £1,500.

Once again we have been amazed this year by people's generosity and continued support for the Scholarship Fund.

Finally, in mid-summer 2022 the Small Park BIG Run (SPBR) was on in person again in Meersbrook Park.

The theme was refugees. An estimated 6 million Palestinians are refugees. They include those families and their descendants who are still looking to return to the homes that were taken from them over 70 years ago and also those who

have been displaced or forced to leave Palestine or their home in Israel since 1948. When Alexi Dimond, the local councillor for Gleadless Valley ward, opened the event, he spoke very movingly about the importance of striving for justice for all refugees.

We were delighted that SPBR raised £4200 this year, half of which went to the Scholarship Fund and half to children's projects in Gaza. This was a little less than in the last couple of years, because there are more expenses when you run an event in person but bringing people together of all ages and experiences – and doing so in tandem with linked activities in Palestine – definitely makes SPBR the very special event it is.

The day opened with Sheffield Extinction Rebellion Samba band, which played as its members walked round a first lap of the park. They were joined by Musheir, Chair of Sheffield PSC, a long-time resident of Sheffield



whose homeland is in Khan Younis, Gaza. Musheir and a few others started their run from the city centre, raising the Palestine flag along the way, and they arrived in the park just on time at midday. This year we paid tribute to Musheir's youngest son, Qayis, a much loved and admired young activist, who died in the autumn of 2021. The Never Stop Dreaming Children's Centre in Gaza has been renamed the Qayis Healing Centre in his honour.



It was a wonderful weekend. There were cups of tea and delicious cakes in the beautiful walled garden, an exhibition and a film about Palestinian refugees. The lanterns that lit the route through the woods during the night were magnificent as was the singing from several choirs, There was also great music along the route during Buskers' Hour. Kites were flown from the top of THE HILL, famous now with runners, and walkers – because it is so steep!

The Lord Mayor of Sheffield, Councillor Sioned-Mair Richards, congratulated the runners, especially the two amazing runners who kept going for the whole 24 hours. She also

congratulated the children who ran the one-lap Fun Run and all those who ran in Palestine. Sheffield's Lord Mayor has attended every year and we'd like to pay tribute to Councillor Anne Murphy, who was at the first SPBR in 2017. Anne, who sadly died just before Christmas, had been a councillor in the city from 2014 and she was a great supporter of the Scholarship Fund.

Before the Fun Run, the Lord Mayor joined in our usual live link up with Gaza. Although technically challenging (the



electricity supply in Gaza is very uncertain), this – as always – was a brilliant way to be in touch with our friends and those doing parallel running events in Gaza.

How the Fund works

The Fund is managed in Sheffield by a small coalition of women working in partnership with the Sheffield Palestine Solidarity Campaign, and in Gaza by a panel drawn from the Board of Directors of the Red Crescent Society and the Union of Health Work Committees, with administrative support from Afaq Jadeeda. In West Bank we work with a committee of women, all of whom are active around women's education and employment. We route our payments for scholarships in the West Bank through the Teachers Creativity Centre based in Ramallah.

In Gaza candidates for scholarships are nominated by their local community centre and are either ready to enter university or are in the first or second year of a course but unable to continue for financial reasons. There are strict selection criteria for the Scholarship Fund, which include having attained 65% or above in high school grades, socio-economic background, commitment to the community, and personal and family circumstances such as a recent home demolition, or war injuries.

Our partners in the West Bank have adapted these criteria for their own student selection process and, as in Gaza, they keep in contact with the scholarship students and help them overcome problems in completing their courses, i.e. not being able to afford transport, books, equipment etc. Our partners can sometimes access other small amounts of funding to cover these additional costs.

In Britain the Fund's supporters make donations or monthly contributions through a standing order and/or by organising or taking part in fundraising events. Any contribution is much appreciated. Standing orders are particularly welcome as they enable us to estimate our income more accurately and to plan.
